

CANADA'S FIRST HOUSING ADVOCATE

THE ISSUE: WHAT'S AT STAKE?

It has been over a year since the Government of Canada made its historic commitment to the progressive realization of the human right to housing via the **National Housing Strategy Act** (NHSA). A key pillar of the NHSA is the creation of the role of the Federal Housing Advocate. Canada will see the **elimination of homelessness and a significant reduction in inadequate housing** if those who have borne the brunt of Canada's housing crisis are able to exercise their human right to housing through a strong Federal Housing Advocate.

WHAT IS THE HOUSING ADVOCATE?

- The Housing Advocate will promote and ensure compliance with the government's legislated commitment to the progressive realization of the human right to housing and to a rights-based National Housing Strategy. The Advocate will actively monitor and drive forward the federal government's progress in setting and meeting goals to this end.
- The Housing Advocate will understand that the NHSA relies on international human rights, in particular the International Covenant on Economic, Social and Cultural Rights, to define the government's commitment to the right to housing as a fundamental human right. Their role will be to issue authoritative opinions about what this commitment means and what measures are required in various contexts, drawing from thorough research,

- engagement with affected communities, consultation with experts, and relevant international human rights norms.
- The Housing Advocate will initiate
 inquiries into systemic housing-related
 incidents, issues, or conditions in any
 community, institution, industry, or
 economic sector within Canada.
- The Advocate will actively shape
 new human rights mechanisms for
 hearing from vulnerable groups or
 affected communities, and for assessing
 compliance with the human right to
 housing.
- The Advocate will receive submissions on systemic housing-related issues, and will report to the federal government on findings and recommendations that will advance the progressive realization of the human right to housing.

- The Advocate may refer critical systemic issues for hearings before a Review Panel, providing the Panel with a summary of the issue and working with affected groups to bring forward presentations and proposals to the Panel.
- The Housing Advocate will amplify the voices of those who have borne the brunt of Canada's housing crisis, prioritizing and representing the voices of those most impacted by, and those with lived experience of, homelessness and inadequate housing.

WHO DO WE NEED TO FILL THIS ROLE?

To drive forward and shape this critical human rights mechanism, Canada needs a candidate with a strong understanding of what this role means and can accomplish. In order to eliminate homelessness and significantly reduce inadequate housing through the NHSA, we need a Housing Advocate who:



Understands their role in the context of the NHSA's
 commitment to the right to housing. They need to be a
 human rights expert who can provide authoritative opinions
 and findings, based on evidence and relevant law, about how
 this commitment is to be fulfilled.



 Can represent, and is preferably a member of, intersectional communities that are affected by homelessness and inadequate housing, with experience of engaging effectively with those communities and advocating for their rights.



 Understands the human right to housing and systemic inequality in housing, and comes from a related sector of work.



 Sees themselves as a human rights defender and vocal advocate. Their passionate, consistent, and human rightsbased advocacy will be essential in shaping this critical human rights mechanism as outlined in the NHSA.
